Easter's Origins

The religious <u>holiday of Easter</u> celebrates the resurrection of Jesus Christ, as described in the Bible's New Testament. Although it is observed as the holiest day by both Christians and Orthodox Christians, it is a movable feast, and is recognized on different days by both religions each year. Orthodox Christians celebrate Easter later than most Christians in the western world because the churches calculate the holiday by different calendars.

According to the <u>Bible's</u> New Testament, Jesus Christ was crucified by the Romans around A.D. 30, died on the cross on a Friday and was buried in a tomb outside of Jerusalem. Three days later, on Sunday, Christ rose from the dead, according to <u>Matthew 28:1–10</u>.

Christians celebrate the resurrection each year on Easter Sunday, the culmination of the 40-day season of Lent. Lent begins on Clean Monday and ends with Holy Week, which includes Palm Sunday, commemorating Jesus' humble entry into Jerusalem, Holy Thursday, honoring the Last Supper, Holy Friday, the day Jesus was crucified and Holy Saturday, the time of transition between the crucifixion and resurrection.

Known as Pascha, the Greek word for "passover," <u>Easter in the Orthodox</u> <u>Church</u> celebrates "the eternal Passover from death to life from earth to heaven." Great Lent, the church's strictest time of fasting, takes place for 40 days, ending eight days before Easter on Lazarus Saturday—when Jesus raised Lazarus from the dead, according to Eastern orthodoxy. Palm Sunday and Holy Week follow, with continued fasting until Easter. Orthodox Easter always follows the Jewish holiday of <u>Passover</u>.

Orthodox Easter takes place between April 4 and May 8, following the first full moon after Passover. Orthodox Easter always falls after the Jewish celebration of Passover, because, according to the New Testament, the crucifixion and resurrection of Christ took place after he entered Jerusalem to celebrate Passover. In 2024, Orthodox Easter occurs on May 5.

Both Christians and Orthodox Christians celebrate the Easter holiday with joyous church services, often punctuated with white lilies, followed by family meals and gatherings. Eastern Orthodox churches often hold a Paschal Vigil on Holy Saturday, the day before Easter, and a candlelight procession may be held that night, with Easter services and celebrations beginning at midnight.

Day of Pentecost

Fifty days after the <u>Resurrection</u>, on the excising Jewish feast of Pentecost, while the <u>disciples</u> and many other followers of <u>Jesus Christ</u> were gathered together to pray, the <u>Holy Spirit</u> descended upon them in the form of "cloven tongues of fire," with the sound of a mighty rushing wind, and they began to speak in languages that they did not know. There were many visitors from the Jewish diaspora to Jerusa-lem at that time for the Jewish observance of the feast, and they were astonished to hear these untaught fisherman speaking praises to God in their alien tongues. This account is detailed in the <u>Acts of the Apostles</u>, chapter 2. The number fifty, as in the fiftieth day after Pascha, stands for eternal and heavenly fulfillment, seven times seven, plus one.

The Orthodox Church sees Pentecost as the final fulfillment of the mission of <u>Jesus Christ</u> and the first beginning of the messianic age of the Kingdom of God, mystically present in his Church. It is traditionally called the beginning of the One Holy Catholic and Apostolic Church.

Besides celebrating the coming of the Holy Spirit, the feast also celebrates the full revelation of the divine <u>Trinity</u>, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. Hymns of the Church, celebrate the sign of the final act of <u>God</u>'s self-disclosure to the world of His creation.

To Orthodox Christians, the feast of Pentecost is not just a celebration of an event in history. It is also a celebration their membership in the Church. They have lived Pentecost and received "the seal of the gift of the Holy Spirit" in the <u>sacrament</u> of <u>chrismation</u>.

Becoming Orthodox—A Spiritual Journey

Becoming an Orthodox Christian is a journey, not an event. It begins with a sincere desire to know God and to follow Jesus Christ. This desire leads to a process of learning and growth, as you explore the Orthodox faith and way of life.

The first step is to start attending services. This will give you the opportunity to learn more about the Orthodox faith and to meet other Orthodox Christians and share in fellowship. You may also want to read books and articles about Orthodoxy, or to talk with our Parish Priest.

As you learn more about Orthodoxy, you will begin to understand the beliefs and practices of the Church. You will also begin to develop a relationship with God and with the Orthodox community. If you feel



called to become an Orthodox Christian, you will be Baptized and Chrismated. This is a sacred and ancient ceremony that marks your full initiation into the Orthodox Church.

Becoming an Orthodox Christian is a lifelong journey. It is a journey of faith, love, and service. It is a journey that will lead you to a deeper understanding of God and of yourself.

Here are some additional things to keep in mind as you consider becoming an Orthodox Christian:

- Orthodoxy is a sacramental faith. This means that we believe that God's grace is communicated to us through the sacraments, such as Baptism, Chrismation, the Eucharist, and Holy Confession.
- Orthodoxy is a liturgical faith. This means that we believe that worship is central to our relationship with God. We worship God through the regular celebration of the Divine Liturgy, as well as through other services such as Vespers and Matins.

Orthodoxy is a Christocentric faith. This means that we believe that Jesus Christ is the center of our faith. We follow Jesus Christ by learning about his life, death, and resurrection, and by trying to live our lives in accordance with his teachings.

Alberta Museum of Canada—Alberta Branch

On June 9, 2023, the Ukrainian Museum of Canada, Alberta Branch after two years of closure, reopened with a new exhibition *Change and Continuity: Keeping Culture Alive.* The exhibition features embroidery, weavings, woodwork, ceramics, religious items and artworks that connect the past with the present. The displayed works illustrate traditional stylistic features in different regions in Ukraine and their adaptation in modern times, showcasing changes in Ukrainian material culture through the ages. Some of the designs belong to the 18th and 19th centuries but still have connections with our time. Art and photographs of Ukrainian historical events provide context to the artifacts on display. As the traditional finds its place in our lives, that culture becomes a living part of our present life.
